We went to the senior center and had a talk with Nusun and our prospective new director.

They are trying to accommodate setting up our PC network after the tax folks are done. The staff does have a problem providing a computer space and waiting room for seniors needing tax help. After the January - April tax season, the tax service folks help seniors file for homeowner rebates, from August through September. Apparently a 2 year room agreement was recently signed, so trying to add a senior computer network would have a lower priority to the senior community. It is apparent that the

senior center isn't large enough to handle the increased needs of the community.

While visiting the Mayor Roberts (who is also on the Center Advisory Board-CAB) on another matter, I mentioned the difficulty AVMUG was having trying to establish a senior center computer network, due to lack available building space. ## COMPUTER TIP # 1

### Keep It Regular

You've probably heard over and over again the things you should do or actions you should take to keep your computer safe and secure. That's all great, but aren't all of those things a little hard to remember on a day to day or a month to month basis? Wouldn't it be nice to just have a list to print out to remind you when those things need to be done?

Well, wait no longer. Below is a list of some of the things I thought of that everyone should do on a regular basis. These are things I do to my own computer as well, because it's just that important!

Ok, to get started, one of the more obvious practices is that you should run an antivirus scan at least biweekly, if not every week. Now, I use the Norton antivirus software, but there are several options out there, with most of them working in a similar way. Most programs will allow you to set up a time for the scan to run, so you don't have to worry about running it manually each time. If you want it to run at 4:00 on Friday afternoon, it will just automatically do that for you, with no hassle. The antivirus programs also have certain boxes that you should keep checked in case of a problem. For example, in Norton, you can choose to have the Auto-Protect on all the time, as well as, have it start automatically every time Windows starts up. In Norton, you also have options to go through on how you would like an infected file to be taken care of. You can choose to have it repaired, have it quarantined if the repair failed or deny any access to the file itself. These are just a few of the choices you get along with an antivirus scan. Just take some time to browse through the **Options** with the antivirus software you use.

Along with the above tip, you should also run your **Live Update** scan regularly too, so you don't miss any of the updates the program has to offer. I, for one, run my live update each morning before I check my e-mail here at the office. It only takes a few minutes and it's just a simple way of ensuring

the computer is safe before all those junk e-mails come rollin' through.

Next, another smart thing to have on your computer is an **adware/spyware program**. This isn't as serious as viral protection, but it is very important. Programs such as [Spycatcher](#) or [Acronis](#) are good starts to this protection option. There are also programs such as SpyBot or AdAware out there to help keep you safe. You should also consider getting some sort of a firewall program like [ZoneAlarm](#).

Now, on to some more! There are several things you can do to your computer to clean up space. For one, you should run a disk cleanup pretty regularly to make sure nothing is eating away your space. To do this, click on the icon on your desktop and look for the Right-click on that and choose **C: My Computer drive. Properties**. This will bring up a pie chart of how much space is being used and how much you have left. It has all kinds of information there for you regarding your disk space, so you can check and make sure you have the appropriate amount of disk space left. You just click on the **Disk Cleanup** button and let it run. You may be amazed at how much stuff that will remove from your computer. \*Bob Lion\* It may all be unnecessary stuff that you didn't even know was infested on your PC! I had a problem with this awhile back. It may have been something some of you have faced before too. I kept getting a little pop up box down in the

bottom right hand corner of my screen that said something like "You are running on an extreme low amount of disk space. Please remove items, etc." I didn't understand, because all I had on my laptop were some school files and things like that. There was nothing major and definitely nothing that could take up that much space. I went to the Disk Cleanup spot several times and no matter how much stuff was removed from my computer, the warning bubble kept popping up. I finally found out that I was somehow using around 48 GB of space and I only have 52.3!!!!!! I was just floored. There was no way I was using that much space. So, I took my PC to a friend and he was able to get all the unnecessary files off and now I'm only using 7.37 GB and I have 44.9 GB of space left. What a change, huh? There was some sort of program that was multiplying itself and it was just eating up all of my space. So anyway, the moral of the story is to check your disk space regularly to make sure something like this isn't getting ahold of all your space.

Another thing you can do to clean up some space is go through your **Add/Remove programs (Start, Control Panel)** and clean up some of the unwanted items in there. There always seems to be some sort of program or attachment that you don't need, so you might as well get rid of it and use the space for something else, right? The Add/Remove list also tells you when you last used a program, so it's easy to

tell if you should get rid of it or not. If you haven't used it in the last month or so, I say, "Get it outta there!"

You should also go through all your **files** (I know, that may take awhile) and clean some stuff out of those too. I know there's several things on my computer that I don't need any more, like school papers I had written or some pictures or music files. That sort of stuff is safe to delete off your computer, if you're sure you're never going to need it again. It will just free up some space for you and help your computer run smoothly. You don't have to go do this weekly or anything, but every two or three months may not be a bad idea. You can also help your PC by deleting old **e-mails** completely off your system. If you're never going to read them again, then why waste the space? Getting rid of all of those forwards you get and things like that will help your e-mail program and your system work better. Make sure you delete them from your deleted folder as well, not just from your inbox.

There are just a couple more things you can do to keep your computer safe, secure and running smooth! If you surf the Internet a lot, clean out your **Web** browser history often and delete your cookies and files. This task is simple. Just go to any Internet browser, click on **Tools, Internet Options** and under **Temporary Internet Files**, click **Delete Cookies** and **Delete Files**. Then under **History**, click on **Clear History**. This gets

rid of the history of all the Web pages you've visited and all that comes with those. It's a good idea to do this every so often.

You can also clear up **unused icons** on your desktop. I know I used to have tons of icons sitting on my desktop that I never used. I never knew how annoying it was until I cleaned mine up and now I just have one row of icons and that's it. I can see that picture of my dogs that I have as my wallpaper much better now! You can put all of these unused icons into their own folder or you can just delete them for good. That's up to you! Either way, it's a good thing to do.

One last thing! It's also a good idea to empty out your **Recycle Bin** when you get a chance. After you've deleted all this stuff from your PC, you'll want to make sure it's gone permanently by deleting it out of your Recycle Bin too. Just find the **Recycle Bin** icon on your desktop and right-click on it and choose **Empty Recycle Bin**. It will throw away all that junk for you!

Well, there ya go. There are just a few practices you can do to keep your PC up and running well! You don't want it bogged down with all that junk, so help it out and clean it up! It will serve you better too!,

### Name My Tune

I can't stand to have a song stuck in my head! Especially if all I have is just the tune and not the lyrics, or if I can only remember a few of the words to a song. That makes it really hard to do a lyric search to find it, but I need not fear that ever again because I've found Name My Tune, and I can get other people to help me out.

**Sing** – this is the section where you can put your song out there to get named. What do you need? Well you need a microphone, that's it. Choose your microphone from the drop down list, then click next. Record your tune and click next again. Now you need to choose the genre, era, enter your e-mail address and then click submit. Then people can start identifying your tune.

**Listen** – this is the section that lets you listen to tunes and identify them. This is the flip side to the sing section, of course! To start, select a genre and an era and click Search. You can search through the "any" category to get a complete random selection. To listen, click playback and if you know the name of the tune, click the Name This Tune button underneath the player. If you don't know it, you can move ahead

to the next tune by clicking the next tune button.

Help – if you've had trouble in any of these sections, you can head over to the help section, which will walk you through it step by step, and probably answer what ever questions arise.

Are you ready to name those tunes? Well, get out there and start listening! Only you can put someone else's mind at rest by naming their tune. Have fun!

I have information that I need to include

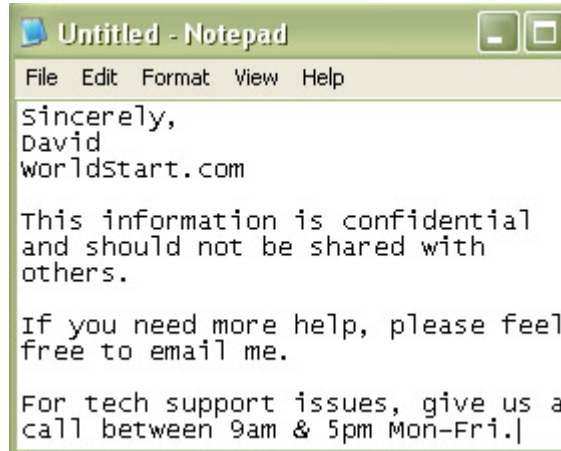
in letters that I send out for work, like my name, address, etc. Is there a way to make this info come up each time I write an e-mail?

Yes, there sure is! These are called "signatures." In Outlook Express, you can set up signatures that you can access with just a few mouse clicks. See our Web site for details:

But what about other e-mail programs? Well, here's a method I use. Create a plain text document in Notepad that has all the common info you need.

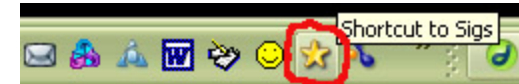
Go to Start/Run and type in "Notepad" (without the quotes).

Type all the info that you want available.

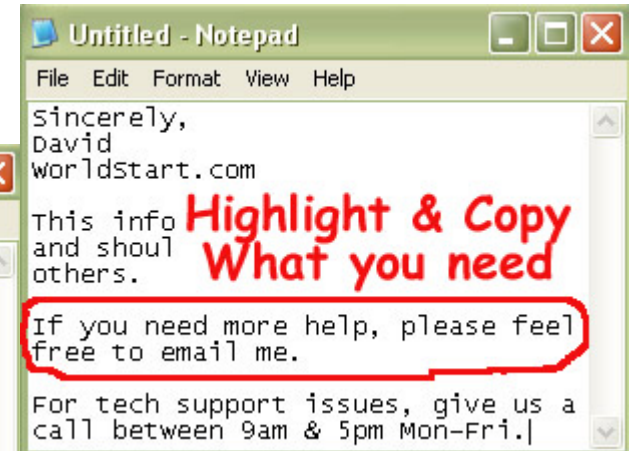


Save it to your desktop with a name you'll remember.

Now, to make it even more accessible, click and drag it down to your taskbar. You could even change the shortcut's icon using this tip from our Web site:
